




NEWS FROM OUR HEAD OF MIDDLE SCHOOL

A MESSAGE FROM OUR **DIRECTOR OF STUDIES & INSTRUCTIONAL LEADERSHIP**

I have spent some time reflecting on our return to school this week, and how wonderful it is to feel as though things are getting back to 'normal' - whatever that means. In this newsletter article, I would like to focus my attention on two groups - our amazing teachers, and our Year 12 students. In my role as Director of Studies and Instructional Leadership, I have the privilege of working closely with both.

The teachers - I am sure there are a few parents in our community who have learned a little more about the role of teachers through our recent time of schooling from home, and perhaps are feeling very grateful for our teachers and the care they give our students. For me, the privilege of having a foot in the camps of St Philip's Christian College Gosford parent, as well as a teacher

and member of the Executive Leadership Team, I have enjoyed the vantage point of observing first hand, just how

dedicated our staff are. During the time of constant change and uncertainty due to the Covid-19 situation, I watched with wonder as our teaching staff reinvented their teaching for an online audience, wrestled with new technology in a considered way, changed from a 6 period-per-day (ppd) timetable to a 4 ppd timetable online to a 5 ppd part online and part at school timetable, without fuss and without skipping a beat, was just amazing. Our staff are now pondering how we will use the lessons we have learned over the past few months, to shape our practice into the future. We don't want to forget. As a teacher and leader in the school, I say thank you.

But more than that (putting my Dad hat on now), I was inspired by the care and love shown to my daughters, through the incidental teaching moments I would observe as I wandered through our kitchen/lounge room space to get my 2nd and 3rd cup of coffee for the day, as I prepared to teach my classes. Our teachers are absolutely world class educators, and they genuinely love their students. As a parent, I say thank you!

Year 12. I have the privilege of working closely with our Year 12 students, and I do mean it when I say it is a great privilege. From a distance, they are a pretty impressive bunch. Community-minded, leadership-focused, and a group that add so much to the culture of our school. And yet, one could argue that this wonderful bunch of young adults have had their opportunity to invest into the life of our community limited in recent times, through a global pandemic. However, they have found ways to invest into the younger students of our school, through recording talks for our online assemblies, through leading devotions in Pastoral Care groups, and so on. On Monday, it was a delight to see them welcoming the students of Junior, Middle and Senior school back – like the first day of the school year all over again – only better. This morning (Wednesday) I met them to discuss the number 146 – that's the number of days until the HSC starts. We plotted and planned how we can get the most out of our time at school together. These students want to do well, but they also want to leave a lasting legacy on SPCC Gosford.

As they work to do this, I pondered the question:

How should we measure the success of an education at St Philip's Christian College Gosford?

Would our list include an audit of the careers of our students, and how these positions in our community are viewed by those around us. Some schools count doctors and lawyers, some count Olympians. So how do we reflect on this.

I am reminded of these wonderful words from Colossians 3:16-17

¹⁶ Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts. ¹⁷ And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

I have seen the joy of the Lord in so many around me during this time of testing, as God's love has been in wonderful evidence, to my great encouragement.

Among the things I have enjoyed about these students, I have been increasingly impressed by the way they have led our school community spiritually. And with this in mind, as we return to school, I have fashioned up a few questions I would like to share for us to ponder on, together. When students leave SPCC Gosford, I wonder:

- have we inspired our students to follow Christ more closely?
- have we guided students so that they see their vocations beyond school as service to God and others?
- have we encouraged in students a long-lasting love and respect for Scripture and given them some sound tools with which to interpret it?
- have we given students the ability to discern cultural idols and the wherewithal to serve God intelligently and faithfully in whatever their chosen occupation / profession?

Does success as a community look like this?

- the celebrations, joys and burdens we share
- the number of broken people being helped to grow, develop and heal
- the number of people wanting to do something to promote justice
- our care for the environment in our actions, not just theory
- the way we serve the community "If your school were to disappear tomorrow would the wider community miss you?"
- the students' passion for learning about God's world
- the teachers' passion for learning about God's world
- the number of 'a-ha!' moments!
- the way we forgive
- the way we laugh
- the students who keep in touch years after graduating...

Harro Van Brummelen (well known Canadian Christian Educator) said that "If the goal for Christian Education can be summed up in one phrase, it is that we ought to guide our students to become response-able disciples of Christ lesus"

When students leave our community, they have two options. They can become culture shapers, or they can be shaped by culture. I know which of those I will be praying for all of our students when they finish their time here. I am thankful to God for the partnership we share

Over the past few weeks, the shop has experienced a mixture of appointments, open times, social distancing and a few line-ups but thankfully, everyone has been patient and considerate while staff ensure that all our families are able to purchase uniforms for their children.

Winter Uniform is required in Terms 2 and 3!

JS/Girls: pinafore, long sleeve shirt, bow tie, stockings (or white ankle socks), olive jumper, black fleecy jacket (over the jumper if cold)

JS/Boys: trousers, long sleeve shirt, olive/gold tie, olive jumper OR olive vest, short grey socks, black fleecy jacket (over the jumper or vest if cold)

MS/Girls: *Skirt remains the same. Short sleeve or long sleeve unisex shirt, bow tie, olive jumper, stockings (or white ankle socks), blazer

MS/Boys: trousers, short sleeve or long sleeve shirt, olive/gold tie, olive jumper or vest, short grey socks, blazer.

SS/Girls: *Skirt remains the same. Short sleeve or long sleeve unisex shirt, black/gold tie, black jumper, stockings (or white ankle socks), blazer

SS/Boys: short sleeve or long sleeve unisex shirt, black/gold tie, black jumper, short grey socks, blazer *All items listed above are available at the uniform shop.

NEW SPORTS UNIFORM: As the cooler weather approaches, the need for the winter sports uniform has seen a flurry of activity in all our uniform shops. We are phasing out the current Daylight sports uniform and all winter items are 40% off. Prices are marked accordingly on the webstore and any items no longer available have been removed.

We are phasing in a new On Track branded sports uniform (summer and winter) and it is a gradual process that is allowing parents another 18 months before needing to purchase these items. The feedback on the new items has been really positive!

In the coming weeks, a video presentation and graphics booklet on the new On Track sports uniform will be sent out to all SPCC families. Once this information is out, we will be encouraging parents to visit the shop to ensure sizing is correct, choose the style of pants etc and then we will place all the new items onto our webstore.

JS/Sport: An all year round polo shirt (new polo shirts are expected in the shop mid-June), shorts (new shorts are charcoal and choice of girls or unisex) and sport socks. If cold...green, fleecy top (K-4), green microfibre pants and jacket (option for Yrs 3 & 4) or 'new' charcoal jacket and pants.

New Jackets: Sports knit fabric

New Pants: Sports knit fabric with tapered leg and reinforced knee.

MS & SS/Sport: All year round... polo shirt, shorts (new shorts are charcoal and choice of girls or unisex) and sport socks. If cold...green microfibre jacket & pants or 'new' charcoal jacket and pants.

New Jackets: Tri-core fabric

New Pants: 2 styles of track pants - Microfibre/4 way stretch with straight leg and sports knit fabric with tapered leg.

National Volunteers week: Last week was an opportunity to recognise and thank all the volunteers that help out the SPCC community and we are SO appreciative of Gail, Lauren, Bettina, Michelle, Gillian and Kristen that give up their time and support the uniform shop. A special shout out to Gail who has been doing this for over 6 years!

Stockings: Black, comfy, long lasting, 70 denier stocking available in 5 sizes. \$10 per pair

Scarves: Soft, warm & and embroidered SPCC scarves. \$22 and available now. The Uniform policy states - "Scarves may be worn in Terms 2 and 3. It can only be the black, SPCC embroidered scarf".

SPCC Delta Folding Rainbrellas - Suitable for students. Indestructible & new folding umbrella frame design - \$22.00 each and...The Pro Umbrella -Stylish, large golf umbrella suitable for parents and staff. \$26.00 each.

Rain Coats: Great 100% waterproof raincoats that protect from the wind and rain while travelling to and from school (especially good if catching public trans

port). They are durable, comfy and clear so you can still see our great SPCC uniform when out and about. All sizes, one great price - \$22!

Slacks for Senior School girls: As an alternative to wearing the skirt during Terms 2 and 3, the uniform shop sells black, tailored slacks with SPCC embroidery. They are \$45 per pair and very comfy. Please note: these are the only slacks permitted to be worn at SPCC.

Second-hand: More bags including blazers processed this week and the SPCC community is blessed to have so many parents supporting our 2nd-hand area to help other families out while also grabbing bargains themselves. This is a hassle free way to get rid of the items you no longer need and we have lots of parents browsing through the racks and shelves each week. Consignment forms are available at the shop or by downloading from the SPCC webpage via the 'uniform shop" tab. At the end of each term you will receive credit vouchers for any items of yours that have sold and these are like "cash" and can be used in the uniform shop or swapped with another parent for cash.
